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Preparing for Finals

Thanksgiving is around the corner and, before you know it, finals will be here. Whether this is your first exposure to college finals, or you're a seasoned pro, now is a good time to prepare yourself physically and mentally for the weeks ahead. We've gathered some of the best finals advice from inside and outside of the College to help you get ready for finals week and walk into your exams with confidence.

1 Start early. Map out time over Thanksgiving break to relax, forget about school, and enjoy spending time with your family. But also consider planning time at the end of break to pull out your materials and get yourself organized. This will allow you to hit the ground running.

2 Mark your exam dates and plan out your study schedule. Share your schedule with your family, your boss and your roommates so that everyone understands and respects your time commitments over the next few weeks.

3 Talk to your instructor about any concepts that are giving you trouble. Ask for advice about outside resources that you may be able to access to further understand the information.

4 Develop your study plan based on the course syllabus and exams. The syllabus includes key concepts and course

organization and provides a good way to structure your review of the material. Material important enough to be covered in a mid-semester exam will also likely be on a final. Your performance on earlier exams can tell you what material you merely need to review and what concepts require more attention.

Research study strategies and choose those that work for you. Take advantage of the LRC tool that tells you what kind of learner you are and adjust your study skills accordingly. Strategies such as creating outlines from research notes or book chapters, making acronyms out of lists of things you need to remember, or putting course content into your favorite rap beat can be very effective at helping your brain learn and retain information.

Don't try to cram a day or two before the test. Research shows that the human brain learns academic material best by learning in shorter increments of time spread out over a longer period. Consider using the "prepare and review" method, recommended by Cornell University's Learning Strategies Center. Organize the entire course material into 5-6 "chunks". On the first day, allocate a block of time to prepare new material for chunk 1, which means outlining chapters, creating flash cards, completing or creating study guides, etc. The next day, break your study

period into segments that includes time to "prepare" new materials for chunk 2, and time to "review" your materials for chunk 1. Continue with this pattern, with review time built in each day for each chunk of material. For more information on this strategy, check out the link on the LRC page of the College website.

Take care of your body. Eat healthy foods and drink lots of water. Try to avoid sugar and caffeine highs

and lows. Plan regular 30 minute walks with a study partner and pick topics you can quiz each other on while you walk. Finally, make time to sleep. An exhausted, sleep-deprived brain will have a much harder time focusing and recalling information than a brain that is well-rested.

8 Take advantage of the LRC. Check the LRC windows for finals week hours and tutoring schedules.

Transfer Credit Deadline for 1st Semester Students: Dec 10

There is an important deadline fast approaching! Transfer credit files for current 1st semester students will be <u>closed and final</u> effective December 10, 2010.

This means for current 1st semester students:

- Outstanding transcripts to be considered for possible transfer credit must be received in the college office ON or BEFORE Dec 10 2010.
- CLEP exams must be taken ON or BEFORE DEC 10, 2010 in order for a score to be considered for transfer credit.
- If a student turns in a transcript or takes a CLEP exam on Dec 11 or later, that information will <u>NOT</u> be considered for transfer credit.

Transfer credit equivalencies (including CLEP exams) can be found on the ACNHS website (Registrar->Transfer Credit -> Transfer Credit Equivalencies).

Even More Incentive To Kick The Habit

Aultman Hospital will soon be joining other health systems in the area in taking a stronger stand against tobacco use. Effective Jan 1, 2011, Aultman employees will be prohibited from using tobacco products during the course of their work shifts or at any time on Aultman property. In addition, Aultman will no longer hire people who use tobacco. The hiring policy is in line with many other local health care organizations, including Cleveland Clinic, Akron Children's Hospital, and Akron General Health System. "The reality is that smoking is the leading cause of preventable death and disease in our country," said Jeannine Shambaugh, chief internal affairs officer for Aultman College. "Health care organizations across the country feel they are driven by their missions to reduce tobacco use. Graduates who smoke may find they have a more difficult time getting hired than

The College is investigating if the policy change in the Hospital will require any policy changes at the College. In the meantime, students who wish to quit using tobacco are encouraged to get help from trained, experienced cessation experts by contacting the Ohio Tobacco Quit Line at 1-800-QUIT-NOW.

December 1: World AIDS Day

Started on 1st December 1988, World AIDS Day is about raising money, increasing awareness, fighting prejudice and improving education. The World AIDS Day theme for 2010 is *'Universal Access and Human Rights'*. World AIDS Day is important in reminding people that HIV has not gone away, and that there are many things still to be done.

According to UNAIDS estimates, there are now 33.4 million people living with HIV, including 2.1 million children. During 2008 some 2.7 million people became newly infected with the virus and an estimated 2 million people died from AIDS. Around half of all people who become infected with HIV do so before they are 25 and are killed by AIDS before they are 35.

The vast majority of people with HIV and AIDS live in lower- and middle-income countries. But HIV today is a threat to men, women and children on all continents around the world. There are currently more than one million people living with HIV and AIDS in America and around a fifth of these are unaware of their infection, posing a high risk of onward transmission. In July, the US launched its National HIV/AIDS Strategy. The Strategy includes three core aims: reducing new HIV infections, increasing access to care and improving health outcomes for people living with HIV, and reducing HIV-related disparities and health inequities. Celebrating A Culture of Caring

hird semester student Stephanie Strader and two Aultman College Alumni Association members received the Aultman Health Foundation Points of Caring award at a special ceremony held on Oct 18 at Kent Stark Professional Education Center. More than 300 family and staff attended the event, which honors the exceptional care provided by the bedside nurses at Aultman Health Foundation. Criteria for the award include caring and compassion towards patients, commitment to the nursing profession, clinical expertise, and community involvement. Stephanie was nominated by Aultman College faculty member Mary Cook for the compassion and patient advocacy she displayed when preparing for and taking part in a clinical that involved caring for a post-op patient who was deaf. The night before her clinical, Stephanie learned several phrases in sign language to help her communicate with her patient. "The patient was impressed and felt a connection to the student from the beginning of the shift," wrote Mrs. Cook in her nomination. While caring for the patient, Stephanie intervened on his

"I had to occasionally miss class because I was on military orders and Mrs. Allen worked with my schedule. She was always more than happy to help me be successful as a nursing student and airman," said Cathleen. "I appreciated her coming out to the base to support me and my military career. Not many people would give up their time and drive more than an hour to see what I do."
