Annual 2014 Campus Security Report

INTRODUCTION

Aultman College prepares this report in cooperation with the Aultman Hospital Security Department for the purpose of compliance with the Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Crime Statistics Act. It is written by the college Title IX Coordinator and includes statistics of the previous three years' reported crimes that occurred on campus and on public property within, or immediately adjacent to and accessible from, the college campus. Statistics are compiled from logs maintained by the Aultman Security force as well as information provided by the Canton City Police Department. This report includes institutional policies concerning campus security and other matters. It is available to all students, employees, and applicants for enrollment or employment, as required by the United States Department of Education, electronically on the college website and the WiseLine student portal. SECURITY ON CAMPUS

Aultman College is a subsidiary corporation of Aultman Hospital and is located on the hospital campus where the Aultman Hospital Security Department provides services for the college.

Safety and security on campus is of paramount importance. Aultman Hospital Security seeks to provide a safe campus environment and regularly patrols the campus area. Although the college does not have a history of serious crimes, no campus is immune. The complete cooperation and commitment of students and employees is necessary to maintain a truly safe environment. Students and employees must also assume responsibility for their own safety and for the security of their personal belongings.

Aultman Hospital Security officers have the authority to ask persons for identification and to determine whether individuals have lawful business at the college. The officers have the authority to issue parking citations but do not have arrest power. They maintain a professional working relationship with and refer criminal incidents to the Canton City Police Department (CCPD), which has jurisdiction on the campus. However, there are no formal written agreements between Aultman and CCPD. All crime victims and witnesses are strongly encouraged to immediately report a crime to Aultman Security, any college faculty or staff member, and/or Canton City Police. Prompt reporting will assure timely warning notices on campus and timely disclosure of crime statistics.

Aultman Hospital Security policies apply to the hospital/college campus. Security considerations relative to campus facilities include but are not limited to locked/badge access entry, indoor and outdoor security camera surveillance, vehicle and foot patrol of parking lots and other campus areas, parking lot escort services, emergency paging and alarm systems, student orientation sessions on emergency and safety procedures, and third-party contractor identification process.

Aultman Hospital Security can and does respond to student-related incidents that occur on campus, and it also has direct communication with Canton City police, fire, and ambulance services to facilitate rapid response in any emergency situation.

Aultman College has no officially recognized student organizations with off-campus locations.

SECURITY AND AWARENESS PROGRAMS

Students receive information about Aultman Security services during orientation sessions and are subsequently routinely informed of ways to maintain personal safety. Similar information is presented to new employees.

The Student Life Coordinator organizes periodic programs on campus that deal with student safety, and the college provides similar updates for employees. Program schedules are communicated to students via the WiseLine student portal announcements, student email, the monthly student newsletter, and bulletin boards located in common areas on campus. Communications to employees are made via the college-wide email system or the Aultman intranet.

INFORMATION ABOUT REGISTERED SEX OFFENDERS

The Stark County Sheriff's office sends monthly update cards of registered sex offenders to the college. This file is maintained by the college main office and is available to students, faculty, and staff. For an electronic listing of registered sex offenders in Stark County, refer to the Stark County Sheriff's web site at <http://www.sheriff.co.stark.oh.us/OffenderLinks.htm>. This web site provides addresses and classification of registered sex offenders. The Aultman Hospital Security department may also assist with how to obtain sexual offender information. Please contact the Security department's non-emergency number, 330.363.6968, for assistance.

GENERAL SAFETY PRECAUTIONS

A common theme of all awareness and crime prevention programs is to encourage students and employees to be aware of their responsibility for their own safety and the safety of others. To enhance personal safety, Aultman Security officers are available to escort students to and from their vehicles parked on the Aultman campus. Students and employees are encouraged to use this service at any time, especially after dark.

Members of the college community are encouraged to assume responsibility for their own personal safety and the security of personal belongings by taking the following simple, common sense precautions:

- Although the campus is well lighted, do not walk alone in the campus area after dark.
- Keep purses/billfolds and other valuables with you or stored in a campus locker, locked office, or desk.
- Do not provide personal identifying information over the phone.
- Report any potential fire hazards or broken equipment to the Aultman Help Desk at 330-363-6238.
- Report any unusual circumstances to Aultman Security (330-363-6268), any college faculty or staff member, or the college front desk (330-363-6347).

REPORTING CRIMINAL OFFENSES

In the event of any emergency, dial 911. To report a criminal offense, call Aultman Hospital Security at 330-363-6268 or use any of the security phones that are located on the Aultman campus. In addition, emergencies and crimes may be reported to any college faculty or staff. Any suspicious activity or person seen on or near the Aultman campus should be reported to Aultman Hospital Security.

The college encourages anyone who is the victim or witness to any crime to promptly report the incident to Aultman Hospital Security, who will investigate all reports and report violations of the law to Canton City Police. The college will investigate and respond to any complaint in a manner that maintains the confidentiality of the victim to the fullest extent reasonable and possible.

Aultman College has no institutional policies or procedures that allow victims or witnesses to report crimes on a voluntary, confidential basis for inclusion in the ASR.

The college also has no procedures that encourage pastoral or professional counselors to inform the persons they are counseling of any procedures to report crimes on a voluntary, confidential basis for inclusion in the annual disclosure of crime statistics.

WENS SAFETY ALERT/TIMELY WARNING SYSTEM

The college utilizes an Internet-based mass communication/timely warning system, called WENS (Wireless Emergency Notification System) to notify all students, faculty, and staff of school closings and emergency situations. In the event of an emergency situation or school closing, an official timely warning message will be sent by the Campus Coordinator to all communication devices students have registered with Aultman College. The WENS caller ID for text or voice communications will read 330-363-6911 on a landline or cell phone. WENS e-mail communications will come from "Aultman College." WENS communications will continue to be sent until WENS confirms they have been received via an answered device or an opened e-mail or text message. Students are responsible for keeping all of their contact information current with the college. Phone number and contact information changes should be communicated through the Change of Information form, available in the main office.

These alerts will not include any victims' names or other information that would lead to their identity being ascertained.

EMERGENCY RESPONSE AND EVACUATION PROCEDURES

Aultman has an emergency management plan designed to ensure there is a timely and effective response in the event of a significant emergency or dangerous situation occurring on campus involving an immediate threat to the health or safety of members of the campus community. Such situations include, but are not limited to: tornadoes, bomb threats, chemical spills, disease outbreaks, or armed intruders. Aultman Hospital Security communicates with local police requesting their cooperation in informing the college about situations reported to them that may warrant an emergency response. Students, staff, and visitors are encouraged to notify Aultman Hospital Security at 330.363.6268, college faculty or staff, or the college main office at 330.363.6347 of any situation that poses such a threat.

Aultman Hospital Security and college administrative staff will confirm the existence of the danger and will be responsible for initiating the college's response and for marshaling the appropriate local emergency response authorities for assistance.

Once the emergency is confirmed, the college community will be notified and security will, without delay, and taking into account the safety of the community, determine the content of the notification and initiate the notification system, unless issuing a notification will, in the professional judgment of responsible authorities, compromise efforts to assist a victim or to contain, respond to, or otherwise mitigate the emergency. When appropriate, the content of the notification will be determined in consultation with local authorities. Also as appropriate, the notification will give guidance as to whether its recipients should shelter in place or evacuate their location.

Aultman Hospital Security and appropriate college personnel will issue emergency notifications using one or more of the following means, which may vary depending on the nature of the threat:

- WENS Alert System
- WiseLine Student Portal
- Appropriate social and broadcast media

College personnel will work collaboratively with the Aultman Corporate Communications team to disseminate emergency information beyond the college community.

The Campus Coordinator tests the college's emergency response system at least once a semester. Aultman Hospital Security conducts periodic evacuation drills for the college and at various times confers with college personnel to train, test, and evaluate the emergency response plan. Aultman Hospital Security maintains a record of these tests and training exercises, including a description of them, the dates and times they were held, and an indication of whether they were announced or unannounced. In connection with at least one such test, the college will begin distributing to students and employees information to remind them of the college's emergency response and evacuation procedures.

ACCESS TO CAMPUS BUILDINGS

The college is a private, independent institution of higher education and is considered private property. To protect students and employees, photo identification badges are issued to provide access to appropriate areas. Persons who do not have legitimate business on campus may be considered trespassers and will be asked to leave. During business hours, the college is open to students, parents, employees, hospital personnel, contractors, guests, and invitees.

ALCOHOL AND DRUG POLICY PROGRAMS

The college has adopted the following substance abuse policy for the purposes outlined below:

- To establish and maintain a safe, healthy learning environment for students/employees
- To provide a safe, healthy environment for clients while providing care
- To preserve the reputation of the college and its employees within the community at large and within the health care community

Underage drinking is prohibited and considered a violation of college policy. The college opposes substance abuse; it will enforce its rules regarding alcohol and illegal drugs and will cooperate with authorities at the local, state, and federal levels regarding the regulation of alcohol and illegal drugs. Furthermore, the college will not protect a student/employee who violates the law from prosecution under federal, state, or local law; neither students nor employees are immune from legal investigation or arrest by civil authorities.

The following rules represent college policy on substance abuse.

- All students are prohibited from attending class, labs, clinicals, or any college related activities under the influence of alcohol or illegal drugs.
- All employees are prohibited from working under the influence of alcohol or illegal drugs.
- The manufacture, sale, possession, distribution or use of illegal drugs on Aultman property or while engaged in official college business and/or educational activities is strictly prohibited and cause for dismissal.
- For purposes of this policy, "illegal drug" includes any prescription drug for which the individual does not have a valid prescription. Only the person for whom a prescription drug is issued can bring the medication on Aultman property in its original container. The student/employee must use the prescription drug only in the manner, combination, and quantity prescribed.

The college requires a student to submit to blood, breath, or urine testing for drugs and/or alcohol for reasonable cause. Refusal to submit to testing for reasonable cause is grounds for dismissal. The college Substance Abuse Prevention Program outlines information for referral resources for counseling and/or treatment; specific local, state, and federal laws governing unlawful possession and distribution of illicit drugs and alcohol; and health risks associated with the use and abuse of alcohol and/or illicit drugs. This information is available in Aultman Hospital's Health Services, the college Financial Aid Office, the college website, and the WiseLine student portal.

VIOLENT OFFENSES OF CONDUCT

Threats

The college believes that a threat to inflict harm on oneself or others while on college premises or at college sponsored events must be taken seriously and responded to immediately. A person hearing such a threat should report it immediately to Aultman security, any college faculty or staff member, or the college front desk.

The college strives to maintain an environment where people of different beliefs and values can live harmoniously. Therefore, any type of verbal or nonverbal harassment, intimidation, retaliation, or threatening behavior will not be tolerated. Depending on the circumstances, this type of behavior could result in dismissal from the college or from employment.

Assault

An assault, sexual or nonsexual, committed by a member of the campus community against another member of the campus or local community will result in immediate dismissal from campus and/or any other college activities. Criminal or civil charges may result. The college encourages all victims to report sexual assaults and seek immediate medical treatment. Reporting the crime ensures that victims receive the needed services, gives victims a feeling of control, enhances their recovery, and also deters assaults from happening to others. College personnel are available to assist victims who request help reporting sex offenses to appropriate law enforcement authorities.

Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, and Stalking

Aultman also prohibits the offenses of domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking. In that regard, the following definitions apply within the state of Ohio:

- *Consent* means words or overt acts indicating a freely given agreement to the sexual conduct at issue by a competent person
 - An expression of lack of consent through words or conduct means there is no consent. Lack of verbal or physical resistance or submission resulting from an accused's use of force, threat of force, or placing another person in fear does not constitute consent. A current or previous dating relationship by itself or the manner of dress of a person involved with the accused in the sexual conduct does not constitute consent.
 - A person cannot consent to sexual conduct if the person is substantially incapable of any of the following
 - (a) Appraising the nature of the sexual conduct due to mental impairment or unconsciousness resulting from consumption of alcohol, drugs, or a similar substance or any other cause or to mental disease or defect that renders the person unable to understand the nature of the sexual conduct;
 - (b) Physically declining to participate in the sexual conduct;
 - (c) Physically communicating unwillingness to engage in the sexual conduct.

See Section 5924.120(A)(3) and (L) of the Ohio Revised Statutes

- *Domestic Violence* means the occurrence of one or more of the following acts against a family or household member: (a) attempting to cause or recklessly causing bodily injury; (b) place another person by the threat of force in fear of imminent serious physical harm or committing a violation of section 2903.211 (menacing by stalking) or 2911.211 (aggravated trespass) of the Revised Code; (c) committing any act with respect to a child that would result in the child being an abused child, as defined in section 2151.031 of the Revised Code; (d) committing a sexually oriented offense.

- “Family or household member” means any of the following:
 - (a) Any of the following who is residing with or has resided with the respondent:
 - (i) A spouse, a person living as a spouse, or a former spouse of the respondent;
 - (ii) A parent, foster parent, or a child of the respondent, or another person related by consanguinity or affinity to the respondent;
 - (iii) A parent or a child of a spouse, person living as a spouse, or former spouse of the respondent, or another person related by consanguinity or affinity to a spouse, person living as a spouse, or former spouse of the respondent.
 - (b) The natural parent of any child of whom the respondent is the other natural parent or is the putative other natural parent.
- “Person living as a spouse” means a person who is living or has lived with the respondent in a common law marital relationship, who otherwise is cohabiting with the respondent, or who otherwise has cohabited with the respondent within five years prior to the date of the alleged occurrence of the act in question.

See Section 3113.31 of the Ohio Revised Code.

- *Stalking* is referred to in the Ohio Revised Code as “Menacing by Stalking.” It is defined as follows:
 - (A) (1) No person by engaging in a pattern of conduct shall knowingly cause another person to believe that the offender will cause physical harm to the other person or cause mental distress to the other person.
 - (2) No person, through the use of any electronic method of remotely transferring information, including but not limited to, any computer, computer network, computer program, or computer system, shall post a message with purpose to urge or incite another to commit a violation of division (A)(1) of this section.
 - (3) No person, with sexual motivation, shall violate division (A)(1) or (2) of this section
 - (D) As used in this section:
 - (1) “Pattern of conduct” means two or more actions or incidents closely related in time, whether or not there has been a prior conviction based on any of those actions or incidents. Actions or incidents that prevent, obstruct, or delay the performance by a public official, firefighter, rescuer, emergency medical services person, or emergency facility person of any authorized act within the public official's, firefighter's, rescuer's, emergency medical services person's, or emergency facility person's official capacity, or the posting of messages or receipt of information or data through the use of an electronic method of remotely transferring information, including, but not limited to, a computer, computer network, computer program, computer system, or telecommunications device, may constitute a "pattern of conduct."
 - (2) “Mental distress” means any of the following: (a) any mental illness or condition that involves some temporary substantial incapacity; (b) any mental illness or condition that would normally require psychiatric treatment, psychological treatment, or other

mental health services, whether or not any person requested or received psychiatric treatment, psychological treatment, or other mental health services.

...

(7) "Post a message" means transferring, sending, posting, publishing, disseminating, or otherwise communicating, or attempting to transfer, send, post, publish, disseminate, or otherwise communicate, any message or information, whether truthful or untruthful, about an individual, and whether done under one's own name, under the name of another, or while impersonating another.

See Section 2903.211 of the Ohio Revised Code.

- *Dating Violence* is not defined in the Ohio Revised Code. However, in accordance with Federal law, the college does collect statistics for these offenses using the definition contained in the Violence Against Women Act. That definition is listed later in this report under the section entitled "Crime Statistics."

Preservation of Evidence

In cases of physical violence, including sexual assault, domestic violence, and dating violence, it is important to preserve evidence, to the extent possible, as it may be necessary for the proof of the crime or in obtaining a protection order. Victims of these crimes are recommended to go to the emergency room as soon as possible for an examination. Victims should not change clothes, brush teeth, shower, douche, bathe, etc. prior to an examination.

It is also important to take steps to preserve evidence in cases of stalking, to the extent such evidence exists. In cases of stalking, evidence is more likely to be in the form of letters, emails, text messages, etc. rather than evidence of physical contact and violence.

Notifying Law Enforcement

Victims are encouraged to report incidents of sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, stalking, and other crimes to Aultman Hospital Security or CCPD. Upon request, the college will assist in making such a report. A victim may decline to notify such authorities.

Orders of Protection

If a campus community member has obtained an order of protection, temporary restraining order, or other no contact order against the alleged perpetrator from a criminal, civil, or tribal court, he or she should provide such information to the Title IX Coordinator. The college will take all reasonable and legal action to implement the order.

Notification to Victims

Aultman will, upon written request, disclose to the alleged victim of a crime of violence, or a non-forcible sex offense, the report on the results of any disciplinary proceeding conducted by such institution against a student who is the alleged perpetrator of such crime or offense. If the alleged victim is deceased as a result of such crime or offense, the next of kin of such victim shall be treated as the alleged victim for purposes of this paragraph.

SEXUAL DISCRIMINATION, HARASSMENT, AND ASSAULT POLICY

Aultman College is committed to providing an environment that respects the dignity of every individual by valuing student talents and perspectives, and to maintaining a safe, supportive environment for students, faculty, staff, and visitors. The college expects all members of its community and guests to act responsibly, showing respect for others and for the community at large. The college does not discriminate in any aspect

of its educational program on the basis of sex and is prohibited from doing so by Title IX. For specifics in regards to this policy refer to the Aultman College Student Handbook.

This policy will also be utilized for complaints of domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking.

ADDITIONAL VIOLATIONS OF CONDUCT

Additional violations of regulations include, but are not limited to:

- Obstruction or disruption of the normal college operations or authorized activities
- Theft or damage to college property or property of any visitor or member of the college community
- Knowingly furnishing false information to the college
- Nonpayment of college fees within the appropriate time period
- Violations of program-specific conduct policies

DISCIPLINARY ACTION DUE TO CONDUCT VIOLATIONS

College disciplinary actions related to conduct include:

- Informal oral reprimand
- Formal written reprimand
- Administrative probation
- Suspension
- Expulsion

Monetary fines may also be enforced to cover costs of labor, materials, and time to repair damaged items.

STUDENT CONDUCT VIOLATION PROCEDURE

Appropriate student conduct is fundamental to a successful academic community. A fair and equitable process must exist to investigate and remedy student violations of conduct policies. When a conduct violation occurs, faculty and staff members must follow the procedures set forth to guide the investigation, decision-making, and appeal process. All violations will be handled consistently, starting at the lowest level. For detailed information on the established procedure, please see the Student Handbook.

Students have the right to appeal decisions which they feel have not been equitable. Refer to the Student Handbook for the appeal process for conduct violations.

COMPLAINT AND INVESTIGATION PROCEDURE

Incidents of sex discrimination, sexual harassment, and sexual assault or violence should immediately be reported to the Title IX Coordinator, student affairs administrator, or other trusted faculty/staff member. Complaints of harassment, sexual or otherwise, will be promptly, fairly, and impartially investigated according to the Sexual Discrimination, Harassment, and Assault Policy in the Student Handbook. The complaint and investigation procedure will be implemented by officials who receive annual training on the issues related to sexual misconduct (including sexual assault), domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking and how to conduct an investigation and hearing process that protects the safety of victims and promotes accountability.

The college will protect the confidentiality of those involved to the extent it can, consistent with its need to investigate the claim. Violators of this policy against harassment will be subject to disciplinary action, up to and including expulsion. Additionally, other remedial measures may be imposed, such as no-contact orders and mandatory training or counseling.

The college will take prompt and reasonable action to protect victims from further harassment or violence. This includes changing the victim's academic or working situation if so requested by the victim and if such changes are reasonably available. For example, the college may reassign the alleged perpetrator to a

different class or provide an escort for the victim to and from his or her vehicle before and after class. These accommodations may be available regardless of whether the victim chooses to report the crime to campus police or local law enforcement.

Both the victim and the perpetrator have the right to be notified about the outcome of the Student Conduct Violation Procedure process and any sanctions imposed, as well as the outcome of any appeals, in writing. Both parties are entitled to be accompanied to any related meeting or proceeding by an advisor of their choice. There is no established time frame for filing a complaint; however, victims of sexual assault are urged to file a complaint as soon as possible. Consistent with the timelines set forth in the Student Conduct Procedure, the college will conduct its investigation as promptly as reasonable and practicable given the nature and complexity of the complaint.

The college will not retaliate against an individual who makes, in good faith, a report of harassment or who provides, in good faith, information in an investigation. The college also will not tolerate retaliation against any individual by others. Like harassment, any instances of retaliation should be reported immediately. Any student who is found to have engaged in retaliation will be subject to disciplinary action, up to and including expulsion. All college administrators should take appropriate steps to disseminate this policy statement and to inform employees and students of procedures for filing complaints. Additionally, all members of the student body, faculty, and staff are expected to assist in implementing this policy.

SEX OFFENSE-RELATED EDUCATION AND AWARENESS

Sexual Assault and Alcohol or Other Drugs

Alcohol and drug use is frequently cited in incidences of sexual violence or assault. Consumption of alcohol can place students at an increased risk for sexual violence or assault. Consenting to sexual activity requires sober, verbal communication that is free of threats, intimidation, or other coercion. Use of alcohol or drugs never makes a victim at fault for sexual harassment, violence, or assault, and should not prevent or dissuade a student from making a report of sexual harassment, violence, or assault under this policy.

Lowering the Risk of Sexual Assault

- Be aware of your surroundings. There is a higher chance of avoiding sexual assault just by being aware of what and who is around you.
- Understand your sexual boundaries and believe in your right to set limits on your sexuality.
- Communicate your sexual boundaries. If someone offends you, clearly state your boundaries up front.
- Avoid use of alcohol and/or drugs. Alcohol and drugs interfere with clear thinking and effective communication, and as stated above, are cited frequently in sexual assault incidences.

Awareness Programming

The college is committed to providing programming which increases awareness of sexual discrimination, including harassment and violence such as rape, acquaintance rape, and other forcible and non-forcible sex offenses. The examples below represent some of the program topics regularly offered to the college community:

- Campus Safety/Crime Prevention Presentation by Aultman Hospital Security Department
- Domestic Violence Training
- Presentation from representative at Quest Recovery services
- Presentation from Rape Crisis Center – Sexual Assault Prevention

ANNUAL DISCLOSURE OF CRIME STATISTICS

Campus crime, arrest, and referral statistics included in this annual security report come from those reported to Aultman Security and the Canton City Police. An email notification is sent annually to all enrolled students providing a link for electronic/college website access to this report. Faculty and staff receive similar notification. Copies of the report may also be obtained from the college main office or the Title IX Coordinator. All prospective employees may obtain a copy in the same manner and location.

REPORT OF CRIME AND ARREST STATISTICS

In accordance with federal law, the college reports specific crimes, attempted crimes, and arrest statistics annually. College policy is to make timely reports to the campus community regarding incidents of criminal activity considered to be a threat to students and employees.

As required, the college compiles the following statistics of reported crimes using the FBI's Uniform Crime Reporting System definitions. According to federal law, incidents of liquor law violations, drug abuse violations, and illegal weapons possession violations referred for campus disciplinary action, regardless of outcome, are to be reported separately from liquor, drug abuse, and illegal weapons arrests in these statistics.

- **Hate Crime:** *A criminal offense committed against a person or property which is motivated, in whole or in part, by the offender's bias. Bias is a preformed negative opinion or attitude toward a group of persons based on their race, gender, religion, disability, sexual orientation, ethnicity, national origin, or gender identity. For purposes of this report, hate crimes include any of the above offenses, as well as the offenses of larceny-theft, simple assault, intimidation, and destruction/damage/vandalism of property, when they are motivated by bias. No hate crimes were reported for 2011, 2012, or 2013.*
- In anticipation of new reporting requirements of the Violence Against Women Act (VAWA), the college is making "good faith efforts" to develop policies, procedures, and training programs that ensure compliance.

UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING SYSTEM DEFINITIONS

In reporting crime statistics, colleges and universities are to use the following definitions from the Federal Bureau of Investigation's reporting system:

Murder and Non-Negligent Manslaughter: *The willful killing of one human being by another.*

Negligent Manslaughter: *The killing of another person through gross negligence.*

Sexual Offenses – Forcible: *Any sexual act directed against another person, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent (forcible rape, forcible sodomy, sexual assault with an object, forcible fondling).*

Sexual Offenses – Non-forcible: *Incidents of unlawful, non-forcible sexual intercourse (incest and statutory rape).*

Robbery: *Taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.*

Aggravated Assault: *Unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault is usually accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm.*

Burglary: *Unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or theft.*

Motor Vehicle Theft: *Theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle.*

Arson: *Any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, or personal property of another.*

Domestic Violence: A felony or misdemeanor crime of violence committed by:

- a current or former spouse or intimate partner of the victim,
- a person with whom the victim shares a child in common,
- a person who is cohabitating with or has cohabitated with the victim as a spouse or intimate partner,

- a person similarly situated to a spouse of the victim under the domestic or family violence laws of the jurisdiction receiving grant monies [under the Violence Against Women Act], or
- any other person against an adult or youth victim who is protected from that person's acts under the domestic or family violence laws of the jurisdiction.

Dating Violence: Violence committed by a person

- who is or has been in a social relationship of a romantic or intimate nature with the victim; and
- where the existence of such a relationship shall be determined based on a consideration of the following factors:
 - the length of the relationship;
 - the type of relationship; and
 - the frequency of interaction between the persons involved in the relationship.”

Stalking: Engaging in a course of conduct directed at a specific person that would cause a reasonable person to

- fear for his or her safety or the safety of others; or
- suffer substantial emotional distress.
